



# **Event: Francis Scott Key Bridge Collapse**

- Yesterday, Governor Wes Moore presided over the first bill signing ceremony of 2024, where <u>he signed into law the Maryland Protecting Opportunities and Regional Trade</u> (PORT) Act. The bipartisan legislation supports businesses and workers who have been affected by the collapse of the Francis Scott Key Bridge.
- <u>Maryland Department of Housing and Community Development</u> under the April 5th executive order, DHCD is authorizing the Neighborhood Business Works Program to provide \$15 million in grants and low-interest loans to eligible businesses of 500 or fewer employees that have been impacted by a loss of revenue or an increase to costs relating to the Key Bridge collapse and will be formally established upon the enactment of the PORT Act.
- Maryland Department of Commerce in partnership with the Governor's Office and local partners launched the <u>Official State of Maryland Business Impact Survey</u>. This survey will help inform how the Port Act funding will be allocated. Impacted businesses should take a few moments to fill it out

#### Recovery

- Recovery operations began March 27th for the missing workers who were on the bridge, but have been paused until salvage operations clear obstructing debris.
- Two bodies were recovered on March 27th and a third <u>body of a missing person</u> was recovered on April 5th.
- Not including the Dali, there are 136 foreign nationals on 7 ships in port. CBP is allowing shore leave and coordinating with the vessels directly.

#### **Recovery Resources**

- <u>Small Business Association (SBA)</u> -businesses impacted by the FSK Bridge collapse are eligible for low-interest, long-term Economic Injury Disaster Loans (EIDLs) to help overcome temporary loss of revenue stemming from the bridge collapse. Eligibility applies to small businesses, small agricultural cooperatives, small aquaculture businesses, and private nonprofit organizations. The application filing deadline is 12/30/24.

## Transportation

- The 695 outer loop is closed at Exit 1, and the 695 inner loop is closed at Exit 43.
- Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration (FMCSA) Extension of Emergency Declaration Under 49 CFR 39.25 No.2024-002. The US DOT and FMCSA, <u>declare that an</u> <u>emergency exists</u> to extend the emergency declaration issued by the Governor of the State of Maryland and continuing the emergency relief granted from certain regulatory requirements in Part 395 of the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Regulations (FMCSRs)
- <u>Maryland Transportation Authority</u> publishes updates on traffic patterns. Additionally, vehicles transporting hazardous materials are prohibited in tunnels and should use the western section of 1-695 around the tunnels. This includes vehicles carrying bottled propane gas in excess of 10 pounds per container (max of 10 containers), bulk gasoline, explosives, and significant amounts of radioactive materials.





#### **Operational Information**

- The US Coast Guard and other lead agencies for the incident have identified three main objectives for the safe removal of the Dali. These are: 1) remove bridge pieces from the ship, 2) Stabilize containers on the ship, and 3)Relocate the ship.
- The estimated total weight of all steel and road deck debris in the water is 27K tons (54 million lbs) Debris in the federal channel is more extensive than previously believed.
- The Unified Command continues to maintain 1 2000-yard maritime Safety Zone for the M/V Dali recovery efforts, and a Temporary Flight Restriction with a radius of three nautical miles from the surface, up to and including 1,500 feet above ground level also remains in effect.
- NTSB continues its investigation and is specifically looking for large pieces of the fendering system of the bridge.
- Transponders for barge locations will continue to be installed.

#### M/V Dali

- Dali crew members remain on the ship until further notice and will report crew emergencies to USCG.
- Hull integrity of the ship has been confirmed by USACE. The vessel is secured by 4 anchors and 1 tugboat. Two additional tugs are on standby.
- Contractor Resolve Marine will coordinate on-board containment of any spilled oils or hazardous substances, along with any recovered containment material. The Dali is being prepped for the start of container removal. The previous concerns of hazardous gasses from fermenting soybeans cargo is nearly addressed. Fermented beans have been bagged and all soybean cargo is being removed. 50 tons of soybeans are left to be removed.
- Damaged containers from the Dali are being removed to the CSX yard by barge for evaluation and disposal. Remaining containers will need to be transported back to the port for processing. The CSX yard is being inspected for future use in docking/ unloading the Dali.
- The <u>removal of containers onboard the Dali</u> at the Key Bridge began on Sunday, April 7th. A total of thirty-four (34) containers have been removed as of 1700 on April 9th.
- Once Dali is floated, it will be moved to Siegert and use the CSX yard for staging.

## Channel

- The Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) has <u>published a tentative timeline</u> to reopen the channel. USACE expects to open a limited access channel 280 feet wide and 35 feet deep, to the Port of Baltimore by the end of April. USACE engineers are aiming to reopen the permanent, 700-foot-wide by 50-foot-deep federal navigation channel by the end of May, restoring port access to normal capacity. Governor Moore <u>published a</u> <u>statement</u>.
- The Biden-Harris Administration <u>Approves Grant Funding</u> to Expedite Capacity Expansion for Port of Baltimore Terminal Operator, Tradepoint Atlantic.

- <u>United States Army Corps of Engineers</u> (USACE) Francis Scott Key Bridge Response Updates.
- A milestone schedule is being put together to track the phases of clearing the temporary channel and the main channel. Currently, it's estimated to be 17% completed.

## Port Activity

- Over the next couple of weeks, six regularly scheduled roll-on/ roll-off (Ro/Ro) vessels and an additional nine redirected vessels will arrive at Tradepoint Atlantic. During that time, 10K automobiles will be unloaded and processed.
- CSX added a new freight route to transport cargo to New York while limited activity continues at the Port of Baltimore.
- All cruise operations are temporarily moved to the Port of Virginia. While ships are not stopping in Baltimore, passengers are still reporting to the terminal and being bussed to/from Norfolk. Approximately 70 buses per ship.
- Maryland State Highway Administration (SHA) Motor Carrier Division (MDC) has taken steps to make available weight permits for containerized cargo commodities heading to Maryland via alternative sea ports such as Norfolk as long as the shipping channel to the Port of Baltimore is blocked.

## Salvage

- Salvage operations on the Francis Scott Key Bridge began March 30th.
- Salvage teams are using an exothermic cutting torch to systematically separate sections of the steel bridge, which will be taken to a disposal site.
- USACE is in the process of picking up a 1K ton lifting capacity hydraulic "grab" to assist with removing wreckage from the bottom of the channel.
